RESOLUTION 17-44

ROGERS TRAIL EXTENSION
PROJECT SPONSORING AGENCY

WHEREAS, in the interest of improved transportation facilities and safety to pedestrian and motoring public, Monroe County and the City of Waterloo, propose to improve Country Club Lane, HH Road and North Market Street by installing a concrete sidewalk adjacent to said roadways from the Rogers Street Trail to the Illinois Route 3 Trail; and

WHEREAS, East-West Gateway Council of Governments is soliciting projects for the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) for the St. Louis Region and the aforementioned Rogers Trail Extension Sidewalk Project is an eligible project.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the County of Monroe shall apply for TAP funds to help finance said Rogers Trail Extension and that the County of Monroe shall be the Local Sponsoring Agency with the City of Waterloo as Co-Sponsor; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Board Chairman be authorized to sign all documents required for submittal in the application of said TAP funds, including but not limited to: Notification of Title IV Requirements, Financial Certification of Matching Funds and that the County Engineer shall be the County Representative and the Person of Responsible Charge of all phases of the project.

RESOLUTION 17-45

INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT
SUPPORTING A FOUR-LANE ROAD/HIGHWAY
CONNECTION TO THE ST. LOUIS AREA

WHEREAS, Article 7, Section 10(a) of the Illinois Constitution of 1970 and the Illinois Intergovernmental Cooperation Act (5 ILCS 220/1) expressly permit local units of government to enter into agreements to exercise, combine, or transfer any power or function not prohibited by law, and

WHEREAS, the counties of Jackson, Monroe, Perry and Randolph agree to form a coalition to discuss, plan and support a four-lane highway/connection to the St. Louis area; and

WHEREAS,, the four-lane connection through the four counties would have a large and positive economic impact on the areas; and

WHEREAS, all the counties support such a connection and wish to vigorously pursue any resources that would bring this to fruition; and

WHEREAS, in that regard the parties agree to regularly meet to discuss, plan, coordinate and act as necessary.

THEREFORE, be it resolved that each county agrees:

1. To regularly meet to discuss, plan, coordinate and act, as necessary, in the development and completion of a four-lane road/connection through the four counties and to the St. Louis area.

2. Any county may freely withdraw from this Agreement without any further obligation.

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This Agreement is entered into the 5th day of June, 2017, by the respective governing bodies of Jackson, Monroe, Perry and Randolph Counties.

Motion was made by Commissioner Wittenauer, with a second by Commissioner Koerber to approve a Raffle License for multiple raffles to the Maeystown Sportsmen's Club, 4309 Baum Road, Fufts, IL. All voting Aye, none Nay and none Absent. Motion carried.

Kevin Koenigstein and Annmarie Marcuson came to the meeting to discuss the accrued Vacation and Holiday time of the employees of the Sheriff's Department. The current amount of outstanding obligation of these two categories for that Department is \$157,629.31. There was some discussion regarding offering these employees the opportunity to cash in these amounts, or to transfer these amounts to the Nationwide 457 plan available through the County to delay some of the tax consequences related to these disbursements. Discussion was also held regarding the payment of some type of incentive to try to convince more of these employees to take the payout to reduce the County financial obligation. The Commissioners said they would like to offer this program to the Sheriff's Department before offering the buyout to the other County employees. Dennis Knobloch suggested discussing this with the County's Labor Attorney to make sure it would be legal to offer this opportunity to one Department and not all of the others. Ms. Marcuson said she would check on that issue. No final decisions will be made until Ms. Marcuson comes back to the Board with answers to some of these questions.

Ms. Marcuson said the Work Center is now available for use by the Sheriff's Department and the Ambulance Service.

There was also discussion of purchasing a new refrigerator for the employee break room in the Courthouse, or an ice machine. Commissioner Koerber offered to work with Ms. Marcuson to get prices on this type of equipment. Chairman Elmore said it is also important that someone takes responsibility for cleaning the refrigerator in that room. Commissioner Koerber said she felt the janitorial staff should take care of that.

Connie Seboldt and Kevin Koenigstein asked to discuss several IMRF issues with the Board. Ms. Seboldt said IMRF is now asking each County to confirm IMRF participation by County elected officials. She said she has completed three Resolutions to cover the seven elected officials

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included in this participation. These resolutions will be brought before the Board at the next regular meeting on June 19.

Ms. Seboldt said she also wanted to discuss IMRF Accelerated Payments. Accelerated Payments occur when there is a shortage in the employer's reserve account. She said many times vested employees will opt to revise their deductions for insurance expenses from pre-tax to post-tax during their last four years of employment to maximize the amount of their calculated IMRF benefit after retirement. During the last three years, four employees have used this strategy that created accelerated payments of more than \$54,000 for the county. There will be more discussion on this issue prior to making any policy changes.

Kim Ahne and Michael Nolte came to the meeting to represent the group – "Waterloo Citizens For a Pool". This is a community organization dedicated to bettering the community, the families and especially the youth, through bringing a pool back to the City of Waterloo. Their goal is to encourage and empower others to get involved and to make a difference in the greater community, and to raise funds to see that vision realized. They have contacted the Waterloo Park District, but the Park District currently has no interest in participating in the campaign to build a new pool. Included in the plans for this development would be a competition pool, splash pad, a leisure pool and a lazy river. This organization hopes to reach out to local organizations and do some fundraising this summer, and possibly take the issue to the voters in March, 2018 to see if they can get the support for initiating a tax. One of their ideas is to include all residents in the 62298 zip code as part of a taxing district to support the pool. Commissioner Koerber said she has talked to the Waterloo Park District as well, and the concern of the Park District is the financial obligation of covering the maintenance and upkeep of the pool.

Sheriff Rohlfing came to the meeting to discuss some of the operational activities in his office. Kevin Koenigstein was also present for that discussion. The Sheriff said there have been property seizures since December 1, 2016 resulting in a percentage of funds being allocated to Monroe County totaling \$23,738.50. Commissioner Wittenauer asked about the related expenses. Sheriff Rohlfing said there is one officer assigned to this work, and his salary with benefits is about \$75,000. He said other expenses related to drug enforcement can also be taken out of the proceeds of these funds that are seized.

Sheriff Rohlfing said regarding the Federal Inmate Housing program, since June, 2016 funds taken in for this program total \$156,103. In FY 2016, \$88,710.33 was received, and so far in FY17 the total received has been \$47,031.69. He said one extra Corrections Officer was hired with total outlay of about \$60,000 including salary and benefits. Commissioner Wittenauer said he thought two new Corrections Officers were hired. Sheriff Rohlfing said no, there was just one new officer hired related to the Federal Inmate Housing Program. He said that transportation and medical costs are paid by the Federal Government.

Sheriff Rohlfing said in relation to his budget he has had to spend a lot of money on retirees. In 2015 he had three people retire, and the time these three employees had on the books came right out of his budget. He said that during the coming year, eight additional deputies could retire, and once again the accrued benefits will have to be paid from his budget. Commissioner Wittenauer said the Board would like to pay out some of this accrued time, and that would help the Sheriff's budget in years to come. There was some discussion of the Monroe County Sheriff's Department budget related to the Randolph County Sheriff's Department budget. Commissioner Koerber said

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she didn't care what Randolph County was spending, she just wanted to make sure the Monroe County Sheriff's Department had the funds necessary to do what needs to be done in Monroe County.

Commissioner Wittenauer said he understood when this program started that the cost would be zero. Chairman Elmore said you have to give the program time to develop.

There was extensive discussion regarding police vehicles and equipment.

Commissioner Koerber asked Sheriff Rohlfing if he could have the cleaning crew monitor the refrigerator in the employee break room on the lower level of the Courthouse. He said he would check on that.

The County Board reviewed the Prevailing Wage rates for the coming year. Mr. Knobloch said the County is supposed to include the most recent wages for Monroe County in this Ordinance, but Illinois Department of Labor has not updated this information since July, 2015, so this is the most recent information that can be included. Motion was made by Commissioner Wittenauer, with a second by Commissioner Koerber to approve the Prevailing Wage Rate Ordinance. All voting Aye, none Nay and none Absent. Motion carried.

ORDINANCE 17-2

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, ILLINOIS, ASCERTAINING THE
PREVAILING RATE OF WAGES FOR LABORERS, WORKMEN AND MECHANICS
EMPLOYED ON PUBLIC WORKS OF SAID COUNTY

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois has enacted "An act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workers employed in any public works by the State, County, City or any public body or any political subdivision or by anyone under contract for public works. "approved June 26, 1941, as amended, (Ill. Rev. Stat. 1987, CH 48, par 39s-1 et seq. As amended by Public Acts 86-799 and 86-693 and,

WHEREAS, the aforesaid Act requires that the Commissioners of County of Monroe investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages as defined in said Act for laborers, mechanics and other workers in the locality of said County of Monroe employed in performing construction of public works, for said Monroe County, so

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Monroe County, Illinois that:

SECTION 1: To the extent and as required by "An Act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workers employed in any public works by State, county, city or any public body or any political subdivision or by any one under contract for public works, "approved June 26, 1941, as amended, the general prevailing rate of wages in this locality for laborers, mechanics, and other workers engaged in construction of public works coming under the jurisdiction of Monroe County is hereby ascertained to be the same as the prevailing rate of wages for construction work in the Monroe County area as determined by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois as of June of the current year, a copy of that determination being

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attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. As required by said Act, any and all revisions of the prevailing rate of wages by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois shall supersede the Department's June determination and apply to any and all public works construction undertaken by Monroe County. The definition of any terms appearing in this Resolution which are also used in aforesaid Act shall be the same as in the Act. (LET IT BE NOTED THAT THE MOST CURRENT PREVAILING WAGE RATE INFORMATION AVAILABLE FROM THE ILLINOIS DEPARTMENT OF LABOR IS DATED JULY, 2015, AND THOSE ARE THE RATES INCLUDED WITH THIS ORDINANCE).

SECTION 2: Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply said general prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained to any work or employment except public works construction of Monroe County to the extent required by the aforesaid Act.

SECTION 3: The Monroe County Clerk shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by any interested party in the main office of the Courthouse this determination or any revisions of such prevailing rate of wage. A copy of this determination or of the current revised determination of prevailing rate of wages then in effect shall be attached to all contract specifications.

SECTION 4: The Monroe County Clerk shall mail a copy of this determination to any employer, and to any association of employers and to any person or association of employees who have filed their names and addresses, requesting copies of any determination stating the particular rates and the particular class of workers whose wages will be affected by such rate.

SECTION 5: The Monroe County Clerk shall promptly file a certified copy of this Resolution with both the Secretary of State Index Division and the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois.

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Explanations

MONROE COUNTY

The following list is considered as those days for which holiday rates of wages for work performed apply: New Years Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and Veterans Day in some classifications/counties. Generally, any of these holidays which fall on a Sunday is celebrated on the following Monday. This then makes work performed on that Monday payable at the appropriate overtime rate for holiday pay. Common practice in a given local may alter certain days of celebration. If in doubt, please check with IDOL.

Oil and chip resealing (O&C) means the application of road oils and liquid asphalt to coat an existing road surface, followed by application of aggregate chips or gravel to coated surface, and subsequent rolling of material to seal the surface.

EXPLANATION OF CLASSES

ASBESTOS - GENERAL - removal of asbestos material/mold and hazardous materials from any place in a building, including mechanical systems where those mechanical systems are to be removed. This includes the removal of asbestos materials/mold and hazardous materials from ductwork or pipes in a building when the building is to be demolished at the time or at some close future date.

ASBESTOS - MECHANICAL - removal of asbestos material from mechanical systems, such as pipes, ducts, and boilers, where the mechanical systems are to remain.

CERAMIC TILE FINISHER AND MARBLE FINISHER

The handling, at the building site, of all sand, cement, tile, marble or stone and all other materials that may be used and installed by [a] tile layer or marble mason. In addition, the grouting, cleaning, sealing, and mixing on the job site, and all other work as required in assisting the setter. The term "Ceramic" is used for naming the classification only and is in no way a limitation of the product handled. Ceramic takes into consideration most hard tiles.

ELECTRONIC SYSTEMS TECHNICIAN

Installation, service and maintenance of low-voltage systems which utilizes the transmission and/or transference of voice, sound, vision, or digital for commercial, education, security and entertainment purposes for the following: TV monitoring and surveillance, background/foreground music, intercom and telephone interconnect, field programming, inventory control systems, microwave transmission,

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multi-media, multiplex, radio page, school, intercom and sound burglar alarms and low voltage master clock systems.

Excluded from this classification are energy management systems, life safety systems, supervisory controls and data acquisition systems not intrinsic with the above listed systems, fire alarm systems, nurse call systems and raceways exceeding fifteen feet in length.

OPERATING ENGINEER - BUILDING

GROUP I. Cranes, Dragline, Shovels, Skimmer Scoops, Clamshells or Derrick Boats, Pile Drivers, Crane-Type Backhoes, Asphalt Plant Operators, Concrete Plant Operators, Dredges, Asphalt Spreading Machines, All Locomotives, Cable Ways or Tower Machines, Hoists, Hydraulic Backhoes, Ditching Machines or Backfiller, Cherrypickers, Overhead Cranes, Roller - Steam or Gas, Concrete Pavers, Excavators, Concrete Breakers, Concrete Pumps, Bulk Cement Plants, Cement Pumps, Derrick-Type Drills, Boat Operators, Motor Graders or Pushcats, Scoops or Tournapulls, Bulldozers, Endloaders or Fork Lifts, Power Blade or Elevating Graders, Winch Cats, Boom or Winch Trucks or Boom Tractors, Pipe Wrapping or Painting Machines, Asphalt Plant Engineer, Journeyman Lubricating Engineer, Drills (other than Derrick Type), Mud Jacks, or Well Drilling Machines, Boring Machines or Track Jacks, Mixers, Conveyors (Two), Air Compressors (Two), Water Pumps regardless of size (Two), Welding Machines (Two), Siphons or Jets (Two), Winch Heads or Apparatuses (Two), Light Plants (Two), All Tractors regardless of size (straight tractor only), Fireman on Stationary Boilers, Automatic Elevators, Form Grading Machines, Finishing Machines, Power Sub-Grader or Ribbon Machines, Longitudinal Floats, Distributor Operators on Trucks, Winch Heads or Apparatuses (One), Mobil Track air and heaters (two to five), Heavy Equipment Greaser, Relief Operator, Assistant Master Mechanic and Heavy Duty Mechanic, self-propelled concrete saws of all types and sizes with their attachments, gob-hoppers, excavators all sizes, the repair and greasing of all diesel hammers, the operation and set-up of bidwells, water blasters of all sizes and their clutches, hydraulic jacks where used for hoisting, operation of log skidders, iceolators used on and off of pipeline, condor cranes, bow boats, survey boats, bobcats and all their attachments, skid steer loaders and all their attachments, creter cranes, batch plants, operator (all sizes), self propelled roto mills, operation of conveyor systems of any size and any configuration, operation, repair and service of all vibratory hammers, all power pacs and their controls regardless of location, curtains or brush burning machines, stump cutter machines, Nail launchers when mounted on a machine or self-propelled, operation of con-cover machines, and all Operators except those listed below).

GROUP II. Assistant Operators.

GROUP III. Air Compressors (One), Water Pumps, regardless of Size (One), Waterblasters (one), Welding Machine (One), Mixers (One Bag), Conveyor (One), Siphon or Jet (One), Light Plant (One), Heater (One),

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Immobile Track Air (One), and Self Propelled Walk-Behind Rollers.

GROUP IV. Asphalt Spreader Oilers, Fireman on Whirlies and Heavy Equipment Oilers, Truck Cranes, Dredges, Monigans, Large Cranes - (Over 65-ton rated capacity) Concrete Plant Oiler, Blacktop Plant Oiler, and Creter Crane Oiler (when required).

GROUP V. Oiler.

GROUP VI. Operators on equipment with Booms, including jibs, 100 feet and over, and less than 150 feet long.

GROUP VII. Operators on equipment with Booms, including jibs, 150 feet and over, and less than 200 feet long.

GROUP VIII. Operators on Equipment with Booms, including jibs, 200 feet and over; Tower Cranes; and Whirlie Cranes.

GROUP IX. Master Mechanic

OPERATING ENGINEERS - Highway

GROUP I. Cranes, Dragline, Shovels, Skimmer Scoops, Clamshells or Derrick Boats, Pile Drivers, Crane-Type Backhoes, Asphalt Plant Operators, Concrete Plant Operators, Dredges, Asphalt Spreading Machines, All Locomotives, Cable Ways or Tower Machines, Hoists, Hydraulic Backhoes, Ditching Machines or Backfiller, Cherrypickers, Overhead Cranes, Roller - Steam or Gas, Concrete Pavers, Excavators, Concrete Breakers, Concrete Pumps, Bulk Cement Plants, Cement Pumps, Derrick-Type Drills, Boat Operators, Motor Graders or Pushcats, Scoops or Tournapulls, Bulldozers, Endloaders or Fork Lifts, Power Blade or Elevating Graders, Winch Cats, Boom or Winch Trucks or Boom Tractors, Pipe Wrapping or Painting Machines, Asphalt Plant Engineer, Journeyman Lubricating Engineer, Drills (other than Derrick Type), Mud Jacks, Well Drilling Machines, Boring Machines, Track Jacks, Mixers, Conveyors (Two), Air Compressors (Two), Water Pumps regardless of size (Two), Welding Machines (Two), Siphons or Jets (Two), Winch Heads or Apparatuses (Two), Light Plants (Two), All Tractors regardless of size (straight tractor only), Fireman on Stationary Boilers, Automatic Elevators, Form Grading Machines, Finishing Machines, Power Sub-Grader or Ribbon Machines, Longitudinal Floats, Distributor Operators on Trucks, Winch Heads or Apparatuses (One), Mobil Track air and heaters (two to five), Heavy Equipment Greaser, Relief Operator, Assistant Master Mechanic and Heavy Duty Mechanic, self-propelled concrete saws of all types and sizes with their attachments, gob-hoppers, excavators all sizes, the repair and greasing of all diesel hammers, the operation and set-up of bidwells, water blasters of all sizes and their clutches, hydraulic jacks where used for hoisting, operation of log skidders, iceolators used on and off of pipeline, condor cranes, bow boats, survey boats, bobcats and all their attachments, skid steer loaders and all their attachments, creter cranes, batch plants, operator (all sizes), self propelled roto mills, operation of conveyor systems of any size and any configuration, operation, repair and

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service of all vibratory hammers, all power pacs and their controls regardless of location, curtains or brush burning machines, stump cutter machines, Nail launchers when mounted on a machine or self-propelled, operation of con-cover machines, and all Operators (except those listed below).

GROUP II. Assistant Operators.

GROUP III. Air Compressors (One), Water Pumps, regardless of Size (One), Waterblasters (one), Welding Machine (One), Mixers (One Bag), Conveyor (One), Siphon or Jet (One), Light Plant (One), Heater (One), Immobile Track Air (One), and Self Propelled Walk-Behind Rollers.

GROUP IV. Asphalt Spreader Oilers, Fireman on Whirlies and Heavy Equipment Oilers, Truck Cranes, Dredges, Monigans, Large Cranes - (Over 65-ton rated capacity) Concrete Plant Oiler, Blacktop Plant Oiler, and Creter Crane Oiler (when required).

GROUP V. Oiler.

GROUP VI. Operators on equipment with Booms, including jibs, 100 feet and over, and less than 150 feet long.

GROUP VII. Operators on equipment with Booms, including jibs, 150 feet and over, and less than 200 feet long.

GROUP VIII. Operators on Equipment with Booms, including jibs, 200 feet and over; Tower Cranes; and Whirlie Cranes.

GROUP IX. Mechanic

SURVEY WORKER - Operated survey equipment including data collectors, G.P.S. and robotic instruments, as well as conventional levels and transits.

TRUCK DRIVER - BUILDING, HEAVY AND HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION

Class 1. Drivers on 2 axle trucks hauling less than 9 ton. Air compressor and welding machines and brooms, including those pulled by separate units, truck driver helpers, warehouse employees, mechanic helpers, greasers and tiremen, pickup trucks when hauling materials, tools, or workers to and from and on-the-job site, and fork lifts up to 6,000 lb. capacity.

Class 2. Two or three axle trucks hauling more than 9 ton but hauling less than 16 ton. A-frame winch trucks, hydrolift trucks, vactor trucks or similar equipment when used for transportation purposes. Fork lifts over 6,000 lb. capacity, winch trucks, four axle combination units, and ticket writers.

Class 3. Two, three or four axle trucks hauling 16 ton or more. Drivers on water pulls, articulated dump trucks, mechanics and working forepersons, and dispatchers. Five axle or more combination units.

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Class 4. Low Boy and Oil Distributors.

Class 5. Drivers who require special protective clothing while employed on hazardous waste work.

TRUCK DRIVER - OIL AND CHIP RESEALING ONLY.

This shall encompass laborers, workers and mechanics who drive contractor or subcontractor owned, leased, or hired pickup, dump, service, or oil distributor trucks. The work includes transporting materials and equipment (including but not limited to, oils, aggregate supplies, parts, machinery and tools) to or from the job site; distributing oil or liquid asphalt and aggregate; stock piling material when in connection with the actual oil and chip contract. The Truck Driver (Oil & Chip Resealing) wage classification does not include supplier delivered materials.

TERRAZZO FINISHER

The handling of all materials used for Mosaic and Terrazzo work including preparing, mixing by hand, by mixing machine or transporting of pre-mixed materials and distributing with shovel, rake, hoe, or pail, all kinds of concrete foundations necessary for Mosaic and Terrazzo work, all cement terrazzo, magnesite terrazzo, Do-O-Tex terrazzo, epoxy matrix ter-razzo, exposed aggregate, rustic or rough washed for exterior or interior of buildings placed either by machine or by hand, and any other kind of mixture of plastics composed of chips or granules when mixed with cement, rubber, neoprene, vinyl, magnesium chloride or any other resinous or chemical substances used for seamless flooring systems, and all other building materials, all similar materials and all precast terrazzo work on jobs, all scratch coat used for Mosaic and Terrazzo work and sub-bed, tar paper and wire mesh (2x2 etc.) or lath. The rubbing, grinding, cleaning and finishing of same either by hand or by machine or by terrazzo resurfacing equipment on new or existing floors. When necessary finishers shall be allowed to assist the mechanics to spread sand bed, lay tarpaper and wire mesh (2x2 etc.) or lath. The finishing of cement floors where additional aggregate of stone is added by spreading or sprinkling on top of the finished base, and troweled or rolled into the finish and then the surface is ground by grinding machines.

Other Classifications of Work:

For definitions of classifications not otherwise set out, the Department generally has on file such definitions which are available. If a task to be performed is not subject to one of the classifications of pay set out, the Department will upon being contacted state which neighboring county has such a classification and provide such rate, such rate being deemed to exist by reference in this document. If no neighboring county rate applies to the task,

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the Department shall undertake a special determination, such special determination being then deemed to have existed under this determination. If a project requires these, or any classification not listed, please contact IDOL at 217-782-1710 for wage rates or clarifications.

LANDSCAPING

Landscaping work falls under the existing classifications for laborer, operating engineer and truck driver. The work performed by landscape plantsman and landscape laborer is covered by the existing classification of laborer. The work performed by landscape operators (regardless of equipment used or its size) is covered by the classifications of operating engineer. The work performed by landscape truck drivers (regardless of size of truck driven) is covered by the classifications of truck driver.

Annmarie Marcuson came back to the meeting. She said she would like to have the new handbook printed at K&D Printing, and she had a quote from them for the cost of printing and binding the book. Motion was made by Commissioner Wittenauer, with a second by Commissioner Koerber to proceed with the printing of the Handbook. All voting Aye, none nay and none Absent. Motion carried. There was also discussion about how to print and add revisions to the Handbook.

Commissioner Wittenauer said a lot of resumes and applications are coming in for the IT Director. He said he is planning to put a team of IT people together to review the applications. He said the Commissioners will also have to decide what level IT person they want for this job- an entry level person, or a seasoned person who will require a higher salary.

Commissioner Koerber said CTS will soon be ready to go through the "end of project" punch list.

There was discussion regarding the Nursing Home Rehab facility project. It is anticipated that the work should soon be finished, and the building should soon be ready for the IDPH inspection.

There being no further business to come before the Board, motion to adjourn was made by Commissioner Koerber, with a second by Commissioner Wittenauer. All voting Aye, none Nay and none Absent. Motion carried.
